

City of Newcastle sought proposals from local and emerging artists to develop a new mural artwork installation in the Newcastle Beach pedestrian Subway.

The call out was open to all artists and collectives with a connection to Newcastle.

After careful consideration, City of Newcastle engaged artist Nickolas Stuart - Olas One to complete the mural artwork 'The Dive' in April 2024.

Nickolas wanted the subway to be inviting, light and invigorating. The completed mural tells a story of refreshment - shaped by the dividing palettes that represent 'the dive' are micro sensations that all happen within moments. The ecstatic entry into the water, through to the lucid and tantalising movement underneath the surface, eventually resurfacing into a state of elevated spirits, tranquillity and bliss with the sun radiating through closed eyes.



Objectives of the Public Art Reference Group

The Public Art Reference Group (PARG) acts as an Advisory Committee to City of Newcastle (CN) for public art. Over the last year the key objectives were to:

- Ensure public art reflects the local identity, diversity, and community of Newcastle.
- Ensure high standards of public art are delivered in the private domain, by outlining requirements regarding artistic excellence, local character, heritage and culture, invigoration of the public domain, sustainability and materiality, and maintenance
- Ensure that public art processes including commissioning, acquisitions, gifting, loans, deaccession, and relocation are managed with planned, methodical, and professional procedures reflecting best practice.
- Increase the number of high-quality public art works being commissioned in Newcastle.
- Provide guidance and advice to developers, artists, curators, CN staff and the community, regarding public art in the private domain as part of development applications in CN.
- Report to Council annually on public art processes and procedures, including the annual financial contributions of new public art commissioned in private development.
- Review processes and procedures for public art and make recommendations for improvements and revisions of all documents, procedural or policy based, pertaining to public art.

• Review and assist CN officers with an audit of all existing public art in CN to provide a basis to assess public art condition and maintenance, ongoing public art management, disposals, acquisitions, and funding.

Orchardtown Road Local Centre Upgrade Project

City of Newcastle's Orchardtown Road Local Centre Upgrade Project is underway and public art is one of the final elements of the upgrade. Newcastle social and artistic enterprise UP&UP Inspirations have been commissioned to produce the murals at three locations in Blackbutt Village following consultation with the New Lambton community and local businesses.

The feedback from the community expressed a desire for a contemporary mural celebrating the native flora and fauna found in Blackbutt Reserve in a unique way.

Two of the three murals have been presented to PARG. The two proposed and endorsed murals will aid in uplifting Orchardtown road and have been designed to add colour and deepen character in the Local Centre whilst capturing the essence of Blackbutt Reserve's natural beauty in a fresh, modern light.

The murals celebrate the relationship between urban spaces and nature, inviting viewers to reconnect with the natural world in an engaging matter.
